He did tell me though that the new owners weren't shy about investing money in their new venture and were very serious about seeing MCT succeed, although they weren't willing to compromise on quality to do it.



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Now, the cynic in me could easily just chalk this up to "CEO talk" and not place too much reliance on it but when I see the way Candolfi talks about their new project as well as longer term plans and the skills they are acquiring to make it all a reality I can't help but be convinced he is being genuine. Even just looking at the quality of the S110 (pictured), MCT's first piece released under the guidance of the new owners, I feel confident the brand is heading in the right direction whilst still staying true to their original DNA. Of course only time will tell how this story plays out. In the fiercely competitive, highly dynamic environment that is the luxury watch industry anything can and often does happen. I am quietly confident though that MCT will succeed, which is why I have designated them as one of the 'ones to watch' in the next 18 months, especially for high-end aficionados who are looking to spice up their collection with something a little different that can still hold its own from a mechanical complexity point of view.
